sonata form derives from binary, but...

- three clear parts: Exposition, Development, Recapitulation

Exposition:

- · establishes tonic, presents theme
- modulates to related key, presents theme
- primary contrast is of key area
 - · existence of "monothematic" sonata

Development

- typically unstable harmonically
- unstable motivically ("working-out" of ideas)
- grouped into subsections and groups by key, motive, process
- typically works with existing themes
- · may introduce new theme

Recapitulation

- recalls all themes (typically)
- typically all in tonic of piece (exceptions exist)
- changes, omissions, reordering all possible and noteworthy

Mozart K. 333

- · listen first, hear sections
- then hear stable-unstable sectional quality

Terminology:

Exposition

First theme: typically a tonally closed passage made up of single phrase or (up to) small form

transition: a passage of music serving to connect passages in different key and using different motivic sources; in a sonata, modulation follows a predictable path, resulting in the "three phases of modulation":

- 1. nothing happens, still in tonic
- 2. leading tone of new key emerges, harmonically supported
- 3. leading tone of V of new key secures the modulation

dependent transition uses material already heard, creating a more seamless sense of transition

independent transition uses basically fresh material (often more figuration than melody), usually producing a very noticeable shift into a new energy level

Second theme:

- primarily a contrast of key area (III or V, typically),
- may use first theme in new key
- often more than one theme in related-key area

Closing theme: additional theme in the new key; often related to first or second theme motivically; brings 1 or 2 complete harmonic movements (often harmonic formulas)

Codetta: after a pretty conclusive cadence to end the Exposition, a short codetta may appear, whose function is to provide more conclusive feel
